Medication Assisted Treatment

Opioid Treatment Ecosystem Model

 Strengthens community-based Medication Assisted Treatment for individuals using opioids intersecting with criminal-legal systems

Medication Assisted Treatment Framework

- Site Exploration
 - Community Readiness Survey (pre and post-implementation)
- Preparation
 - Monthly Change Team meetings, involving jail staff and community providers
- . Implementation
 - Access to medications, discharge planning, community coordination
- Sustainability
 - Ongoing communication, partnerships, funding, and evaluation

Impact & Facts

Drug Overdose Crisis

- 2,532 overdose deaths in Michigan (2022)
- Michigan ranks in the top third for overdose death rates
- High impact on the criminal/legal system

Substance Use Disorder in Jails

- 63% of jailed individuals meet Substance Use Disorder criteria
- 11% receive any treatment, <1% receive jail-based Medications for Opioid Use Disorder
- Individuals released from jail with untreated Opioid Use Disorder are 129 times more likely to die of an overdose within two weeks

Purpose of Jail Medicated Assisted Treatment

- Increase post-release treatment engagement
- Prevent overdoses
- Reduce recidivism and reincarceration
- Decrease community drug-related crimes

Achievements

412 individuals enrolled in Medication Assisted Treatment in 4 jails

31 naloxone vending machines placed in jails and community sites since July 2021

Positive changes in stakeholder attitudes towards in-jail Medication Assisted Treatment programs

Strengthened relationships and partnerships

Why Medication Assisted Treatment in Jails?



of individuals serving sentences in US county jails *meet the criteria for substance use disorder* (SUD)



of people incarcerated in the U.S. who meet criteria for SUD *will receive SUD treatment*



of incarcerated individuals with a diagnosis of OUD *will receive MOUD jail-based treatment*

129x

within the first two weeks, individuals released from jail with an untreated OUD are 129 times more likely to die of an overdose compared to the general population



Increases probability of incarcerated individuals engaging in *treatment post* release



Can prevent fatal and non-fatal overdoses, reduce reoffending/reincarceration rates, and decreases drug-related crimes in communities

CBHJ Implementation Framework



Site Exploration

Community Readiness Survey administered to jail administration, jail medical staff, and community health/mental health providers (pre- and post-implementation)



Preparation

Monthly Change Team meetings, including jail command staff, jail medical, community mental health, community providers, and CBHJ staff.



Implementation

Implementation of *validated screening tool*, access to *all forms of MOUD*, access to *psychosocial services* (individual/group therapy, peer support, classes), *discharge planning*, and *community coordination*



Sustainability

Ongoing communication, partnerships, funding, and evaluation
